Props: Six posters with the letters "C," "H," "E," "E," and "R" (one on each poster), and one poster with the letters "FUL" on it

Seven Scouts hold up the posters as the Cubmaster calls the letters.

Cubmaster: "Give me a C! (A Scout holds up a poster, prompting the audience to yell "C!")

"Give me an H! (The next poster goes up, etc.)

"Give me an E!

"Give me another E!

"Give me an R!

"What are we full of?" (The audience yells "Cheer" when the poster with "FUL" goes up.)

This can be repeated multiple times—slower, faster, louder, softer, etc.

CRAFT PROJECTS

Since the holiday seasons sort of go together, I have included Thanksgiving even though it is not quite December. It belongs to the *Celebrate* theme if you want to get started a bit earlier.

Stuffed Turkey by John Talbot

Stuff a Turkey with thanks. This craft project is one that I have done in my family that makes us all cheerful and starts the holidays off in a good mood.

- 1. Take a facial tissue box that is cubical in shape and wrap it in brown paper. Leave a slit in the top, where the tissues are pulled out, uncovered.
- 2. Cut out some feathers from colored paper and glue them to one side.
- 3. Make a turkey head and glue that to the other side.
- 4. Make some feet and glue them to the bottom.

Now that the turkey is made, place it in a public place and supply some small pieces of paper (approximately 2 x 3 inches) to write what you are thankful for on them. Fold the pieces of paper up and stuff them in the turkey. Open it up on Thanksgiving dinner or Christmas dinner and read some of the things that people are thankful for. What better way is there to be cheerful than to think of the things that we are thankful for.

A Wreath of Kisses by my daughter Katie Talbot

Take a package of Hershey kisses and glue them to a cardboard cutout wreath. Do something kind for someone else and get a kiss during the holidays. Make the service moderately substantial like cleaning up the toys or doing the dishes (if the cubs are properly trained not to break glasses). This will make everyone cheerful throughout the season.
